#### SOS-UK IS AN EDUCATIONAL CHARITY


- SOS-UK is part of that NUS family that has been at the forefront of social change since 1923

80% would like to see sustainable development actively incorporated and promoted through *all* courses




59% say sustainable development is something they would like to learn more about




#### AND THAT GOES BEYOND STUDENTS' TIME IN EDUCATION

Option 1: A position with a starting salary of £3000 lower than average (£20,000) in a company with a strong environmental and social record


Option 2: A position with a starting salary of £3000 higher than average (£20,000) in a company with a poor environmental and social record





As part of our Invest for Change campaign, email your University's senior management to ensure their investments are funding environmental and social justice solutions and engaging with investments to change corporate practices.

#### Take AGM action


Lots of universities hold investments in companies, known as shares. Anyone who invests in a company, has a say over how the company is run. We're calling on universities to use their power as shareholders to actively engage - and vote - at company <u>AGMs</u>.

This year, campaigners are calling for HSBC to stop funding fossil fuels at its AGM on June 28th.

Since the Paris Agreement, Barclays and HSBC, two of Europe's biggest fossil fuel financiers, have funnelled over US \$255 billion into to the coal, oil and gas sectors, according to the <u>Banking on Climate Chaos report</u>.


#### Support the #SDGTeachIn




## Read about links between sustainability & intersectionality

#### **COP26 Action Week**


You're invited to take part in SOS-UK's COP26 Action Week competition this week, for the chance to win an ethical food box worth £15 or £35.
