Professor Andrew King

Professor of English Literature and Literary Studies

It's what I ask of "English literature," whether it's trade magazines, popular fiction, Shakespeare or George Orwell. It's ultimately what I want students to ask themselves too. Professor in Sexualities and Genders: Health & Well-Being

My greatest highlights have been the students! That's not cheesy: I mean it! Whether pre-registration or post grad: nurses, midwives, health visitors, school and district nurses and paramedics, they have all studied amazingly. That's despite massive upheavals of on-going Covid-19! Some have experienced personal illness or bereavements; some volunteered for Covid testing; many transferred to front-line Covid services; most experienced unprecedented work-place challenges. Yet they have met the challenges, and continued studying. Giving pastoral care and signposting to Students' Union welfare, dyslexia and disability support, is always a win / win, such is the calibre of services.

I have taught new creative digital skills and championed on-line learning; students have been nothing less than inspirational in their engagement. I love technology, so I constantly learn more to implement and share across teaching, learning and assessing, including to colleagues and through wider academia. The result is such joyous learning and tremendous personal outcomes, for so many! My National Teaching Fellowship motif of 'Sharing learning outside the classroom' continues, with my use of Adobe Creative Cloud; implementing creative digital skills and even writing a chapter in (Turner and Fanner, 2021, eds) Digital Connection in Health and Social Work perspective from Covid-19. Another high-point was my belated Professorial Inauguration1, on World AIDS Day 2021. I'm now in my 33rd year of teaching, starting in HIV studies, then widening out across sexual health, and I still love every minute of it!

Five more memorable highlights are being part of the Staff LGBTQ+ Community, and our work, under the leadership of our amazing Vice Chancellor, to achieve Gold Award in the Stonewall Top 100 Employers; my co-authorship of the Student Relationships, Sex and Sexual Health Survey, of the Higher Education Policy Unit; becoming a Recognised Research Supervisor of the UKCGE; on-going mentoring of Senior & Principal Fellows of the Higher Education Academy, ultimately boosting excellence across our own University, and, this morning, presenting via pre-recorded video, to around 400 GPs, gynecologists and nurses!

Ad moltos annos! "To many happy years", for each and every one!

Jeff Powell


Senior Lecturer in Economics

Dr Jessica Simpson


Lecturer in Sociology

Shortly after I joined the University of Greenwich, I reached out to GSU to find out if there is any support available at the university for students who are also sex workers. My interest in this area stems from my research with both student and graduate working in different areas of the sex industry and which highlighted the unique challenges they face due to the stigmatisation of their work. I received a prompt reply from GSU Officers, Zoe Campbell and Nele Leitolf, who are also sex worker allies and who were keen to meet. We discussed how, even though over 133,000 UK students are estimated to work in the sex industry, there is still an overwhelming silence around the topic and a lack of support both at Greenwich and more broadly.

I have since worked closely with GSU, and Nele specifically, who has been pivotal in the ongoing development and delivery of a wide range of evidence-based provisions for both students and staff. So far, we have created a steering group where we work collaboratively with staff from across the university with different expertise and perspectives to identify potential policy implications and to develop what we consider to be best practice in supporting students. We have also hosted a range of events on the realities of student sex work and to challenge harmful narratives as well as providing disclosure training for staff. Next term, we plan to host a student-led panel event where students can ask questions and learn more about how to be a good ally in a non-judgmental and inclusive space. Overall, it has been an absolute pleasure working with GSU and the ongoing support has been invaluable. I would like to take the opportunity to commend Nele for her commitment to and genuine care for student wellbeing, she is a credit to the university and will be sadly missed!

Dr Melissa Pepper


Senior Lecturer in Criminology
