Responsibilities

- To be the voice of students on your programme, studying in the same year
- To keep abreast of student issues amongst your programme, through actively engaging the opinions of your peers
- To represent your peers opinions and interests and address issues that impact the quality of their experience at the University of Greenwich (this involves attending various meetings and activities)
- To feedback information to the Students' Union, various committees, and University staff as appropriate
- To work with the Students' Union to develop policy, end bad practice, and educate students about important issues within their education
- To liaise with your Programme Leader and Tutors on a regular basis
- To become actively engaged with how decisions are made on your programme

Details

Location: Based predominantly at your site of study, with possible travel between sites as necessary for training, networking, and meetings

When: Term-time only (October – June)

Duration: For the length of your Programme at the University

Time Commitment: Flexible; 1 hour per week average

- You will gain and refine countless transferrable skills like communication, negotiation, problem-solving, time management, teamwork, public speaking, and much more
- The Student's Union will provide training and constant support
- You will help to drive change on your Programme, within your Faculty, at the University, and the Students' Union
